ARTS & CULTURE SECTOR'S PERCENTAGE OF U.S. ECONOMY (Artists, University Arts, Commercial & Nonprofit Arts Organizations Combined)

ARTS & CULTURE SECTOR REPRESENTS 4.2% OF NATION'S GDP & 4.6 MILLION JOBS

U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis reports that nationally the arts and culture sector was a \$876.7 billion industry in 2020, representing 4.2% of the nation's GDP, **4.6 million jobs**, and total compensation of **\$446 billion**.

PA ARTS & CULTURE SECTOR REPRESENTS 3.3% OF STATE'S GDP & 156,980 JOBS

U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis reports that the arts and culture sector contributed \$25.7 billion to PA's economy in 2020, representing 3.3% of the state's GDP, **156,980 jobs**, and total compensation of **\$13 billion**.

BONUS: In 2020, PA arts and culture was also larger than the Agriculture industry.

LOSS OF REVENUE AND JOBS (Commercial & Nonprofit Arts Organizations Combined)

Between 2019 and 2020, the U.S. arts economy shrank at nearly twice **the rate** of the economy as a whole. Arts and cultural production fell by **6.4%** when adjusted for inflation, compared with a **3.4%** decline overall.

PA arts and culture value added decreased by 5% between 2019 and 2020. In addition, arts & culture employment decreased by **13%**, dropping from 180.216 to 156.980.

ECONOMIC IMPACT OF NONPROFIT ARTS ORGANIZATIONS & THEIR AUDIENCES

Nationally, the nonprofit arts industry alone generates **\$166.3 billion in** economic activity annually that supports 4.6 million jobs and generates **\$27.5** billion in federal, state, and local government revenue.

• Spending by arts audiences generated **\$102.5 billion** to local businesses.

DRIVER OF OUR NATIONAL, STATE & LOCAL ECONOMY.

In 2015, nonprofit arts organizations in the state generated **\$3.4 billion in** economic activity annually that supported 100,114 jobs and generated **\$402.1 million** in state and local government revenue

• In the **Lehigh Valley** specifically, nonprofit arts groups generated **\$83.2 million** in economic activity. Audiences of 3.6 million people added another **\$103.2 million** in related spending for a total of **\$186.4 million** for the region in 2015, and this generated **\$18.8 million** in local and state government revenues.

PUBLIC INVESTMENT IN GRANTS TO NONPROFIT ARTS ORGANIZATIONS & ARTISTS

How much is the federal government investing in the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA)?

Congress allocated **\$180 million** to the NEA in **FY22**. This amounts to just **54 cents** per capita. Ideally, Congress should index \$1 per capita funding to the NEA. For COVID economic relief, Congress also allocated **\$75** million in CARES Act and **\$135** million in ARPA funding for distribution by the NEA. Additionally, Congress allocated **\$16 billion** to the SBA for shuttered arts venues plus billions more for PPP and EIDL.

How much did PA receive in public funding for the arts and culture?

In **FY21-22**, the state allocated **\$10,457,000** to the Pennsylvania Council on the Arts. The Pennsylvania Council on the Arts also received **\$1,015,800** in federal NEA funds and **\$1,433,000** in ARPA and CARES Act funds. Both ARPA and CARES Act Funds supported **528** grants. Another **91** nonprofit arts organizations received direct grants from the NEA totaling **\$4,220,000**.

THE ARTS ARE EVERYWHERE!

- Starting in the Lehigh Valley, ArtsQuest's Musikfest attracts more than 1 million visitors to **Bethlehem** each year. Musikfest is the country's largest free music festival.
- Head south to **Chadds Ford** and enjoy the art of the Wyeth family at the Brandywine River Museum. In addition to the Wyeth family's work, the museum also houses a cross-section of American art with special focus on artists from the Brandywine Valley.
- Start a tour of Lancaster with a visit to the Ware Center, the city's newest visual and performing

- arts center. It is located in the heart of the arts & historical district. Down the street is the Fulton Opera House, and located along **Prince Street** are arts galleries to appeal to everyone's taste.
- Head up to **State College** to attend the Central Pennsylvania Festival of the Arts in July. The Festival assists the Nittany Valley Running Club in presenting the Sue Crowe Memorial Arts Festival Races, and Schlow Centre Region Library in presenting BookFest.
- Head west to Ridgway and attend the annual Chainsaw Carvers Rendevous. Over 60 carvers from

- around the nation participate in this experience.
- The City of **Sharon** sits unassumingly in the Shenango Valley of **Mercer County**, nestled against Pennsylvania's border with Ohio. But this quiet city is home to a unique arts festival— Waterfire Sharon! The festival incorporates the contributions of dozens of local galleries and works of art lining downtown Sharon. The family-friendly event offers an opportunity to walk the main streets of the city traffic-free in the glow of the river's stunning display of fire.
